

Nova Scotia Update

- "Assessment of Eligibility and Readiness for Hormones and Surgeries with Persons with Gender Identity Disorder" was the focus of a two day Education session facilitated by Dr Gail Knudson (Sept. 17 /18, 2008). The Transgender Health Clinical Case Review Team organized the event, with support from our "Pride Health" office and Dalhousie University's Department of Psychiatry. The objectives included various aspects of determining Eligibility and Readiness, as outlined in WPATH's Standards of Care. Many of the 12 participants were also presenters, representing transgender health initiatives currently existing across various medical and mental health specialties (both Adult and Child/ Adolescent Health Services). There was a sense of strengthening our clinical group - from within. On the morning of the second day we met, as a group, with Chris Power - the CEO of Capital District Health Authority (Adult Service). There was much useful discussion - highlighting Policy Develop-

ment as a critical next step in support of Transgender Health becoming a legitimate recognized entity within Primary Health Care Services in this province. Dr Knudson also presented at Dept of Psychiatry Grand Rounds; an engaging presentation - well informed and well attended: " Gender Identity Disorder: Current Events and Controversies".





Nova Scotia Update

IWK Health Centre Trans Health Team

Two clinicians in the IWK Health Centre Mental Health program have formed a team to help address the mental health needs of transgendered youth in the Maritimes. Social worker, Nancy Wright and Suzanne Zinck, child psychiatrist, are accepting referrals of youth up to the age of 19 years old, from the Maritimes, who are questioning their gender identity.

The role of the team is to assess and treat youth who are questioning their gender identity or wishing to live as the opposite sex. The team can offer assessment, psychotherapy and treatment of any co-occurring mental health problems and can serve as a referral route for other specialized services, including addictions counseling, and medical and surgical specialists.

The youth, a family member, a mental health professional or a physician may make referrals to the IWK Trans Health team by contacting IWK Mental Health Central Referral, at (902) 464-4110. 

The Youth Project has two full-time and two part-time staff – Leighann Wichman has been involved with the Youth Project from it's inception as a youth herself and has worked in many capacities within the Youth Project leading to her current position of Executive Director. Among her many roles, she facilitates professional development workshops and works with our Board of Directors and Youth Board. Julien Davis is the Support Services Coordinator at the Youth Project, offering supportive counselling, facilitating social support groups and maintaining other support services (such as our food bank) and has been involved since 2004. Sandra Bornemann is the Outreach Coordinator and is working to create safe access points for youth in rural parts of Nova Scotia and runs our Ally card program – a program designed to promote safe, supportive people to LGBT youth. Shawn Wood is our new Community Educator – he facilitates workshops in the schools throughout the province addressing homophobia and transphobia in the schools.

The Youth Project is very excited to be celebrating its 15th anniversary this November 15th, 2008. We will be holding a party with current and past youth, volunteers and supporters with videos, speeches and some drag performances by the youth. Newfoundland and Labrador Update

On September 15th and 16th, Dr Gail Knudson crossed the 'Big Pond' (aka Atlantic Ocean) after crossing the 'Big Rock' (aka Canada) from Victoria and hit the ground running! First she met with the Transgender Working Group for Eastern Health chaired by Isobel Keefe (Assistant Director Mental Health and Addictions Program). The committee has been meeting for a year given a mandate to develop a policy for access to health care for trans people. Gail brought her experience, knowledge and expertise to the group and offered valuable and thought provoking insights. Next she was ushered off to the Health Sciences Center for Grand Rounds ("Gender Identity Disorder: Current Events and Controversies"). A record attendance of upward to 90 people included all health care disciplines, government officials, media and Trans individuals as well as representatives from community groups like PFLAG and EGALÉ. This was followed by an evening session for Psychiatrists. Early next morning a group of Family Doctors gathered for a breakfast presentation on "Treatment of Transgender Health Issues". For me this was the highlight of all the gatherings! These FMDs have been on the front lines with TG patients, with little or no support, leading the way in TG Healthcare and for the first time came together. Next it was off to a morning of consultations followed by an afternoon meeting with Child and Adolescent Medicine health care providers. In total over 250 individuals attended were exposed to Trans Gender Health Care during these packed 48 hours. Now that is quite the number given the total population of Newfoundland! Trans Gender Health Care has arrived and as Dr Knudson said "it's a process..." From Newfoundland we want to extend our thanks to Dr Knudson..."long may your big jib draw"

New news: The "Transgender Working Committee" hopes to have the Access to Healthcare Policy completed before the New Year! A big step in an ongoing process to open doors for those on the TG journey!




CPATH 2009 Meetings
